

Special Recipe For Bread


Ingredients:

Golf-ball amount of yeast 2/3 cup of warm water 1½ tablespoons of oil 1 tablespoon of salt



Method:

1) Dissolve the yeast in the water and leave it for ½ an hour. 2) Add the seeds to the mixture and add enough water and flour to form a stiff batter. Leave for ½ an hour. 3) Add the oil and salt, mix thoroughly and add enough flour so that the mixture holds together. 4) Turn out onto a floured surface and knead for ten to fifteen minutes. Knead with the bottom of the hand, pushing air out of the bread. It is essential to keep your head full of positive thoughts whilst kneading. 5) Leave for one hour or until the mixture has doubled in size. 6) Knead again for a few minutes then cut the bread in half. Knead each loaf. 7) Put the bread in the oven and gradually increase the temperature over a period of c. forty-five minutes till it is turned on full. 8) Leave the bread in on full for ten to fifteen minutes. 9) When the bread is cooked the bottom will ring hollow when tapped. Turn the loaves out onto a wired tray. It should not be eaten until it has cooled or you will get tummy ache!

The Queer Evangelical

Life in St. Andrews can be difficult enough for the average student, I mean with all the choice of who do I meet for coffee today? Where am I going to have lunch? And, well, where shall I not go clubbing? We have this interspersed with moments of normality (sleep), moments of complete insanity (essay crisis) and then the odd get-away-from-it-all (home for the holiday). However, for most of us life is a little bit 'different'...after all, perish the thought that any of us would happen to fancy someone of the same sex! Oh dear. Well, that adds a little bit of spice to our lives, which, to quote Stuart from Queer as Folk are "so f**cking huge!" You may well quess who this is by now.

Some, though, have a more 'different' time that others. Not that I wish to mark myself as having a *really* difficult time...but, as an Evangelical Christian, being Gay does mean I hit a few brick walls now and again. Believing in the inspired Word of God and evangelising mean that both sides of the 'divide' can tend to view me with suspicion, if not, at times, a little contempt.

Thus, one is forced to ask how is it then that I can consider myself both Gay and Evangelical—I wish I had the answer to that one. All that I can say is that I am what I am, and I believe what I believe. There is, to my mind, no deep psychological or philosophical position one can take—it's that simple.

The realisation of my sexuality and my faith came at about the same time, and as one grew and developed so did the other. It has been a difficult path, but I doubt that any of us have an easy life, and in some ways mine has been an easy one; My parents are relatively liberal (though they don't 'know'), I was brought up in a Middle Class environment and went to a good public/state school. I have found acceptance of my sexuality from my Christian friends and understanding of my faith from my gay friends.

Though it isn't always so, my regular practice of wearing a cross has more than once brought me into conflict with a 'sister' or two. These two facets, Gay and Evangelical, have been reconciled in my life and I have not lost the integrity of either. In fact, each educates the other. Though many would, in a post-modernist identity/idea split, push my Faith into a private realm and my Sexuality into a Public Truth, I would probably view it the other way: They exist as a mixture of public and private, ancient and modern, liberal and conservative. My being Christian guides how I treat people and means that I apologize a lot (even when it is not necessarily my fault but my responsibility) and being gay affects my view of the Bible, the Church in general and the way in which I interact with other people. I have a dual culture of "Two Worlds".

It has been a challenge, and as my Lord and Saviour tells me, it will remain so. Life is not easy, some of us develop a deity of one person, others of the land, I believe in the God of Christianity, happen to fancy men, and am generally contented with that position. To modify a motto: I'm here, I'm a queer Christian and I'm here to stay!"
